Commander's Letter

I'm pleased to announce that **Emily Pugh**, a freshman at Ephrata High School, was selected as the Voice of Democracy Patriotic Audio Essay winner for our Post. Emily will be presented with VOD Plaque and \$250 for her presentation on, "Is this the country the founders envisioned?". Our Patriot's Pen winner is **Rachel Carter**, an 8th grader at Valley Academy of Learning in Wenatchee. Her essay on "What is patriotism to me?" was also selected as the best essay in District 7. In addition to receiving cash awards and plaques from the Post and District, Rachel's essay will be elevated to the Department of Washington for their judging panel that meets later this month.

This next Saturday, **December 19**th **at 9am**, we will hold our annual **Wreaths Across America** event at Evergreen Cemetery in East Wenatchee. We recognize that due to our current COVID restrictions, our ceremony will need to be modified. Instead of everyone gathering around the flagpole, the Wreaths Across America Ceremony will be published in this newsletter for you to read. Also, there will not be a presentation of colors by the honor guard. Instead, participants will be asked to sufficiently space at the start of rows where boxes of wreaths will be positioned. *Please stay in your family group to minimize contact with others*. After welcoming remarks, we will have the Pledge of Allegiance fol-

lowed by a prayer by Chaplain Simonson. We will then place the wreaths on graves. After our wreath laying at Evergreen, a few wreaths will be taken to Stemilt Hill and Sunset Cemeteries for placement on veteran graves there. **EVERYONE PLEASE WEAR A MASK**.

We've also been busy identifying potential projects to help local veterans and their families with makeovers and renovations. Home Depot Foundation and team members of the Wenatchee Home Depot Store have partnered with us once again to make a difference in someone's life. This new project is to construct a large wheelchair ramp at a residence in East Wenatchee. The architect's plans are complete and the **grant from Home Depot has been awarded**. We're going to ask local contractors if they can join us on this project that should take less than 2 days to complete. We will announce a project date and location once the materials are procured and professional volunteers identified. Check our Facebook page and post website for all project announcements (web addresses can be found on the Mailer Cover page).

The names Zoom, Skype, Google Meet, and Facetime were unknown to a majority of us a year ago. I hope most of you have tried at least one of these video conferencing applications (apps) during the past months to stay in contact with your family and friends. They are really nice tools that allow you to see and hear the people that are important to you. We have started a **Zoom Friday Morning Coffee Breaks** to take the place of our good old Friday gathering BC (Before Coronavirus). With some success (1 out of 3 weeks), we've had a meetup on Zoom to enjoy some conversation from the comfort of our own home, drinking our own coffee, and eating our own pastries. I really want to encourage you to join us at our next gatherings on **December 18 and January 1 from 9am-10:30am**. These upcoming and future Zoom Coffee Breaks will also be listed on our website and Facebook. Just follow the link in the announcement to join our Zoom meeting. If we get a large enough number of participants for the coffee breaks, we'll open up several different "Coffee Table" Zoom links so you can join the conversations at different "Tables" like; "Stan's Table of Tall Tales", "Jude's Table of Cute Pups", or "Schwab & Dent's Table of Old Cars". Drop in for some conversation, drop out and join another "Table". It's that easy!

Once you become familiar with Zoom, don't limit its use to just the VFW Coffee Break. We hope to expand to using it for meetings, special events, and our chair yoga classes. Please know that we are here to help you get setup for these events and provide some instruction on how to use Zoom. If you're the intuitive type, you can always go to the Zoom website for tutorials and instructions on the app.

In closing, I wish everyone a safe and happy holiday season. These next few months are looking to be the most challenging during this pandemic as infection rates continue to rise in our community. It will also take everyone making informed decisions for themselves and their families on how to best get through this. I hope this finds everyone well and healthy. This has been a very trying year for everyone. The limitations from the stay-at-home orders has made for interesting times. Fortunately, we have been able to still provide some assistance to those in need and remember our Veterans.

Since there were no ceremonies on **Veterans Day**, which we all missed, we were able to, with the help of our Post, to put flags at the veteran graves at Evergreen Cemetery. We had about fifteen people turn out including Police Chief Johnson and Sheriff Burnett and their families. The Wenatchee World was there to interview those in attendance and had a nice article in the paper.

When the devastating fires hit the Colville tribe in the fall, our Auxiliary member Leona Wolk coordinated efforts to get relief to the area. She went to the area while the fires were still going and caravanned with others to get emergency supplies to those in need. In the following weeks, we donated funds from the Auxiliary and had donations from others to buy tents, lanterns, blankets, food, and water to be delivered to the Colville tribe members. Auxiliary members made numerous trips to Okanogan during this time delivering food and supplies.

Our Auxiliary has adopted a Veteran and his 3-year-old son. The Veteran works with the homeless through an outreach program. Unfortunately he has been unable to do his job because of the stay-at-home orders. We are hoping to make it a good Christmas for him and his son. We will be collecting clothing, toys, and \$\$s to make this a good Christmas for them. If anyone would like to donate, they can contact me directly.

A special Thank You goes out to **Dee Johnson** for her efforts with **Operation Homefront** through the Dollar Tree Stores. She picked up the donated items and delivered everything to East Wenatchee schools. The schools will see that needy children get the toys.

Our hospital chairs, Bicky LaRoque and Carol Trunzo, are keeping in touch with those in area nursing homes. They have coordinated our sending cards and making small gifts for those who cannot have contact with family members at this time. We must make sure those in nursing homes and their caregivers are not forgotten during these trying times.



Going Digital: Website, Email, and Zoom

As one of the younger, more tech-adept members of our Post, who works in the digital realm for clients on a regular basis, I felt it was my duty to help our Post and Auxiliary move into the 21st century just a little bit more this year.

Over the course of the past 12 months, I've **rebuilt our website** to be easier on the human eyes as well as the search engines. If you haven't seen it yet, please visit https://vfwpost3617.org and take a look around. While some things from the past are still missing, such as information about our Veterans Memorial which I will be adding in this winter, I have added some new features to the website that I hope you'll check out. We now have a **Members Only area**, which requires access to view. Items such as the previous meeting's minutes will be posted in this account-required section of the website. 

We now have an **email list** you can sign up for if you'd like to receive digital communications from the Post. Once the first stay-at-home orders were put in place, we knew it was time to move forward with a digital meeting platform. Collecting Flags for Proper Disposal

Among the many small improvements we've made at our Post Home during this forced closure is our new Flag Depository box out front.

We often hear community members lamenting that they don't know where to take their old, faded, tattered, worn-out US flags for a proper disposal. We've always been a place to drop these off, but only during open hours. Since we're not open regular hours at the moment due to the public health advisory, it made sense to offer an outdoor, all-hours-access safe place to drop off old flags.

Thanks to Commander Pieratt's ingenuity, and spotting a good deal, we now have a durable, weather-resistant Flag Depository box next to the door at our Post Home. Anyone can come and drop off their worn-out flags any time of day without worry.

Deposited flags are regularly removed from the Depository and taken to the VA Hospital in Spokane. We are hoping to partner with a local organization for hosting proper Flag Retirement ceremonies in the future.
