SWEEPING LEGISLATION FOR OIF/OEF BURN-PIT AND VIETNAM ERA VETERANS On June 16<sup>th</sup>, the U.S. Senate passed the Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act of 2022 by a vote of 86 to 14. This bill (H.R. 3967) will help veterans who have been exposed to toxic chemicals from burn pits. It will help veterans get the benefits and care they deserve.

It also includes coverage for veterans and family members exposed to contaminated water at Camp Lejeune Marine Corps Base in North Carolina. Also included in the bill is coverage for veterans that served outside Vietnam, but none the less were exposed to herbicides at their duty stations.

In short, military members that served overseas on active duty on or after August 2, 1990 in: Iraq; Kuwait; Bahrain; Oman; Qatar; Saudi Arabia; UAE; or Somalia are considered as a Covered Veteran for the purpose of this Bill.

Additionally, military members that served on or after September 11, 2001 on active duty in Afghanistan; Djibouti; Egypt; Jordan; Lebanon; Syria; or Yemen are also covered.

This bipartisan legislation has a provision that will establish a presumption of service connection for 23 conditions and cancers. *Presumption means that if you have one of these conditions and served in the stated geographic areas, it's more likely than not that your condition is related to your military service.* In other words, veterans would not have to find medical literature to convince VA what we've known all along; burn pits are toxic and cause serious health problems. This is a huge win for millions of brave men and women who are still suffering the effects of their deployment.

### THE PRESUMPTIVE DISEASES SPECIFIED IN THIS BILL INCLUDE:

**FOR OIF/OEF VETERANS**: This bill covers Asthma (diagnosed after military service); Chronic Bronchitis; Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD); Constrictive Bronchiolitis; Bronchiolitis; Emphysema; Granulomatous Disease; Interstitial Lung Disease; Pleuritis; Pulmonary Fibrosis; Sarcoidosis; Chronic Sinusitis; Chronic Rhinitis; and Glioblastoma.

And the following cancers of any type: Head; Neck; Respiratory; Gastrointestinal; Reproductive Organs; Lymphoma; Lymphomatic; Kidney; Brain; Melanoma; and Pancreatic cancer.

For "Vietnam Era Veterans", H.R. 3967 also expands the locations where exposure to certain Herbicide Agents occurred. These areas include **Thailand, Laos, and Cambodia, Guam, American Samoa, and Johnson Atoll**. The dates for exposure to herbicides at these locations vary, but in general it includes dates from the early 1960s to as recent as 1980.

Once this Senate amendment is approved in the House, it then moves on to President Biden's desk for his signature. Twenty-three medical conditions and cancers would be added to the list of those that can be presumed to be service-connected, meaning veterans would not have to prove a causal link between their condition and their time in service.

### THE IMPORTANT PART

Due to the vast content of the H.R. 3967 (150 pages), the information presented above is only a quick look at some of the main points. **Once this legislation is finally law**, I recommend you contact your County Veterans Service Officer to check your eligibility on these new presumptive diseases and start building your claim.

### **MANLEY MARTINSON CELEBRATES 96 TH BIRTHDAY**

Comrade Manley Martinson celebrated his 96<sup>th</sup> birthday with friends at Friday Coffee on June 24<sup>th</sup>. A longtime member of the VFW, Manley joined the US Navy in 1944 and trained as a Motor Machinist's Mate (MoMM) before being assigned to the USS Princeton, USS Vulcan, and USS Deuel. It was aboard the Deuel that he took part in the Battle for Iwo Jima as the mechanic assigned to a landing craft (LVT) that brought marines and supplies to the volcanic shores of Iwo Jima. Happy Birthday Manley and thank you for your service and sacrifice during WWII.

<u>PANGBORN FESTIVAL of FLIGHT</u> On October 3, 1931, Clyde Pangborn and Hugh Herndon left Sabishiro Beach in Misawa, Japan, to fly Miss Veedol across the ocean in the first non-stop, trans-Pacific flight. After 41 hours in the air, Miss Veedol crash landed on the bluffs above East Wenatchee what is now the Fancher Heights neighborhood. The Wenatchee Valley has been connected to Misawa and the aviation world ever since and Pangborn's Festival of Flight was created to celebrate this historic event.

On August 6<sup>th</sup> from 9am-3pm, Pangborn Memorial Airport will be celebrating its annual Festival of Flight. This year's exhibits include the Commemorative Air Force with their **B-17** "Sentimental Journey" and **B-25J** Mitchell "Made in the Shade". There will be limited opportunities to take a tour inside these aircraft as well as paying for a "ticket" for a 20-minute flight aboard these planes. Both aircraft will be at Pangborn from August 2-7 and available for tours and flights. Cost for ground tours is \$15 per person, or \$30 for a family of 4. 
