Why Worry?

We all experience worry at some point in our lives, don't we? An unexpected bill comes through the door that we haven't budgeted for, and we worry about how we are going to pay it. A loved one arrives home 30 min-



utes after they said they would, and we have spent the whole time worrying that something may have happened to them. Your child goes off to nursery for the first time and you spend the day worrying about how they are getting on and if they have settled ok.

We all have these times where we feel out of control and unable to balance all of the plates spinning in our lives. We turn to worry, trying to figure out how we can resolve a certain matter or problem, sometimes without going to the Source first.

There is nothing wrong with caring, we all have things that we care about and that is good. But when caring becomes worrying, it robs us of our joy and depletes the energy we need for life.

Pause to read today's verses, found in Matthew 6:25-34. Matthew starts off by acknowledging the things that we all need - food, drink, and clothes. We know it. Matthew knows it. **God** knows it! We can rest assured that God is aware of what we require to live well and has plans to provide them.

Matthew goes on to illustrate this by pointing out that even the birds of the air go day to day, trusting the provision of the Father. They do not fly around worrying about their next meal or where they will build their nests – it is all richly provided for them by God in nature.

Can we achieve anything with our worrying? Or does it simply drain the joy out of our lives?

Matthew adds that the flowers in the field are better dressed than we could ever hope to be even though they are discarded after the day is done. How incredibly valuable are we to God compared to them! Remember **that** when you are worrying. He loves you and cares about what you need. He even cares about what you **want!** God knows the desires of our hearts as well as our needs.

Friends, how will we stand out to a world that is lost and searching if we live our lives worrying about the same things as those who don't yet know God. We must resist worry and fight for peace. Look to God's business rather than your own and He will look after the rest. Live in accordance with His ways and He will provide you with all you need. Don't worry about the future, God know the plans He has for us (see Jeremiah 29:11) and if we trust Him, that can be enough.

Passing of Nick Hamburg

Our friend and buddy Nick Hamburg passed away suddenly on September 28th after fighting an infection for the last couple months. Nick was born in Everett on January 31, 1983 and moved with his family to Wenatchee in 2005. Shortly after moving here, I met Nick at a Mike Utley Foundation event, he was riding his hand cycle. He said he always appreciated military members and veterans for their service, so I invited him to one of our Friday Community Coffee gatherings. After meeting everyone on his first visit, he made an effort to be there every Friday to visit his friends. He became a fixture at our VFW.



Nick wanted to help us during our Spring and Fall Buddy Poppy Drives by handing out poppies and receiving donations from the public. He usually paired up with a couple of our older WWII and Korean War vets at the old Food Pavilion Store (now Grocery Outlet) in East Wenatchee. Looking back at our volunteer list, Nick helped raise over \$100k in Veteran Relief donations during 32 poppy drives over the years. He may not have served in the military due to his spina bifida, but Nick certainly SERVED our local veterans and their families by his efforts to raise relief funds. He made a difference in the lives of many.

Always happy to talk with veterans, he really appreciated the kindness and attention he received at the Post. Quite often when a veteran would present him with pin, patch, or military unit shirt, Nick would be proudly wearing it at our next gathering. He was a good friend of everyone he met, especially the Comrades and Auxiliary members of this Post. Rest in peace my friend.

The Wenatchee Valley VFW Post 3617 has received 2 cemetery plots in the Veterans Section of Evergreen Memorial Park, East Wenatchee. The current market value of each plot is approximately \$8,000. The cost of transfer of ownership will be approximately \$200 per plot. Each plot may be further divided into 2 parcels to accommodate 2 cremains.

VFW Post 3617 is offering to sell the plots as configured for \$6,500 each. The purchaser will be responsible for any transfer fees.

Wheelchair Ramp Projects

We're just finishing up our last ramp project of the year at a veteran's home near Monitor. The 39-foot ramp was assembled in just 3-hours by our small crew. We're getting better at this as we remember not to repeat the mistakes of our previous builds.

By teaming up with **Operation Ramp**It **Up**, our capability to help more veterans with ADA access to their homes is improved greatly. It also stretches out our grant funds from Home Depot as we no longer have to build the entire ramp from wood. We just use the grant to pay for minor alterations to the existing property that will allow for the attachment of the modular aluminum ramp.



Gold Star Families Memorial Dedication



Auxiliary member Tara Damschen attended the Gold Star Families Memorial Monument dedication in Lynnwood on 02 Nov. This monument is the 200th such placed in the country and the 3rd monument placed in the state of Washington. It is located in Veterans Park at 44th Ave W in Lynnwood, WA. The Park is maintained by members of VFW Post 1040.

Last Summer, our Post donated \$1,000 towards another such memorial being built at Tahoma National Cemetery in honor and memory of our local Gold Star family of Lando Jasso. Once we have more information on that Monument's dedication, we'll be sure to let everyone know.
