

LOWES MAKEOVER PROJECT AT THE POST On December 3rd, a team of volunteers from our local Lowes arrived to spruce up our bathrooms and center hallway. The team of 10, with expertise in flooring and painting, got right to work at 8:30am to fix perhaps our biggest eyesore at the Post: our bathrooms. The taping crew got busy with removing and taping hardware and repairing damaged areas on the walls. They were followed by a paint priming crew that sealed the walls in preparation for the paint. The painting crew followed them to



lay on a fresh coat of paint. Meanwhile, while all the painting was happening, a couple team members were laying down some new vinyl plank flooring in the central hallway. In total, the complete project was finished within 8 hours. **Special thanks to Lowes and their team of volunteers**, and to comrades Carbins and Reinfeld who helped out with the project.



**NEW FLAG INSTALLED AT PANGBORN** On December 14th, at the last possible moment before the big snowstorm was scheduled to hit our valley, Douglas County received the new flag for the Pangborn roundabout. With literally less than an hour before it started snowing, we were able to assemble a crack team of volunteers to change out a very worn flag in less than optimal conditions. The old flag was lowered and removed from the halyard and the new 20 x 30 foot flag was raised just as the winds came up and the snow started to fall. Not an ideal day to do this, but the swap out was long overdue, delayed by supply chain issues, and we had to retire the old flag. Thanks to the A-Team of Dave, Parish, Ed, and Don who braved the elements and made this happen.

We adopted a great family for Christmas this year. Father, mother, and four daughters ages 17, 15 (twins), and 1 year old. **Thank you for the numerous donations of both gifts and cash**. We were able to give each child a \$100.00 gift card as their Santa present along with many other presents. We also gave the family grocery cards to spend as they see fit. The family recently came to Friday coffee at the Post to meet and thank everyone for the gifts.

Carol Trunzo and Billie Reynolds kept us busy with favors for the nursing homes for Fall, Veteran's Day and Christmas. Three very different craft projects and all fun to make. Carol delivered them to Bonaventure and the other facilities we regularly visit. It sounded like everyone who received one was thrilled. **Our next crafting project will be for Valentines Day**. We will also work with local schools for Valentines for Veterans. All of the Valentines made by school children will be sent to the Soldiers Home in Orting and the tiny home veterans village at Walla Walla.

We are still working with the Red Cross to coordinate a **Blood Drive this Spring**. The tentative date will be in March. If you have not signed our list of interest please do. We need to let the Red Cross know we have interest before they will commit the unit from Spokane. Signing the list does not commit you to giving blood: it just shows that we have interested individuals. If you are worried about your age or medication disqualifying you, don't worry - They will let you know when you go to give blood if you are eligible. More people qualify than think they will. As you may have seen on the news this winter has been really hard on the blood supply. Nationally there is a severe shortage. We are hoping to get not only Post 3617 members but the public as well to turn out and give blood. We will keep everyone up to date as we get closer.

The Auxiliary has done a **winter project for the homeless** the last few years. We normally try to collect clothing, hygiene, and other needed items in January and February to distribute at the end of February. This year we are changing it up a bit and **doing a food drive**. Bicky shared that one of the larger food banks for the Wenatchee area closed its doors at the end of December. No reason was given for their closing down. To pick up the slack, **Serve Wenatchee** is trying to get more donations so they can offer their services to more families and we want to help. There will be a collection box at the Post starting in the first week of January. We are asking everyone to donate canned goods and

# A Star Amongst Us



#### God is in Control

Some era-defining words have entered the English language in recent times. A good example is the Collins Dictionary Word of the Year 2022: 'permacrisis' – defined as 'an extended period of instability and



insecurity' and, many would say, a spot-on synopsis of the past few years. In the face of global uncertainties, we can't help wondering: where is it all heading? And what will the future look like? Many would question, how do we remain steady, unruffled, energized, and robust on the inside, no matter how crazy things get on the outside?

God has some questions of His own for the prophet Isaiah (in Isaiah 40:25–26 NIV): "To whom will you compare Me? Or who is My equal?" says the Holy One. Lift up your eyes and look to the heavens: Who created all these? He who brings out the starry host one by one and calls forth each of them by name. Because of His great power and mighty strength, not one of them is missing.'

When was the last time you gazed up at the heavens on a still, clear night, far from urban light pollution? In the passage from Isaiah, we read that God 'calls forth each of them by name' and that 'not one of them is missing.' And that's just a glimpse of God's 'great power and mighty strength,' considering that these are only the stars in our galaxy, which is merely one of about 100 billion galaxies in the universe.

These verses from Isaiah are an awe-inspiring reminder that God is in control and that He cares about the details, down to the last star. This is very good news for us. It means we can stop worrying about everything we can't control. The world may be sunk in a permacrisis, but God remains in control of everything that's happening on the earth and everything that's going on in our individual lives, down to the last detail. 'God doesn't abandon or forget even the small sparrow He has made,' Jesus says. 'How then could He forget or abandon you? What about the seemingly minor issues of your life? Do they matter to God? Of course they do! But the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Do not fear therefore; you are of more value than many sparrows. (Luke 12:7)

### Wreaths Across America

On a very cold December 17th morning at Evergreen Memorial Cemetery, officers and members of our Post & Auxiliary performed a solemn ceremony to mark the National Wreaths Across America Day.

Each December on this day, the mission of Remember, Honor and Teach, about the lives and sacrifices of our veterans, is carried out by volunteers across the nation, coordinating wreath-laying ceremonies with



the main event at Arlington National Cemetery. These ceremonies are held at more than 3,700 additional locations in all 50 States, as well as at sea and abroad. Each location hosts their event at the exact same time as the ceremony held at Arlington, which takes place at 12 noon on the third Saturday in December. At 9am local time, our brief ceremony commenced and we laid wreaths around the flagpole in honor of each branch of the military and in remembrance of the veterans buried at Evergreen.


## VFW Commendation Medal Presented
