On Saturday, September 9, the Wenatchee Valley VFW and American Legion Post 10 will be hosting the annual All-Veterans Picnic at **Walla Walla Point Park at Picnic Shelter #1 from 11am to 3pm**. We'll be offering the same great food that everyone raved about last year: hamburgers, hot dogs,



brats in beer, and of course the freshest sweet corn from Kallstrom's in Quincy, picked just hours before we serve it!

<u>9/11 REMEMBRANCE CEREMONY</u> On Monday, September 11th from 11am to 12:30pm, the annual 9/11 Remembrance Ceremony will take place at the **9/11 Spirit of America Memorial** located in Cashmere at Riverside Park, 201 Riverside Dr.



The Memorial site, built in 2015, includes a piece of structural steel from the 60th floor of one of the Twin Towers, an ornamental piece of limestone from the face of the Pentagon and four bronze statues, together representing all those who perished on September 11th, 2001. Today the Memorial also includes "The Survivor Tree", a Callery Pear Tree like the one pulled from the smoldering rubble of the World Trade site, and four granite monuments. The monuments are en-



graved with the names of those who perished on airplanes at each tragic site – Pentagon, World Trade Center site and Shanksville, Pennsylvania. Learn more about the Memorial at https://911memorialwa.org/

Youth Scholarships



Voice of Democracy

Since 1947, the Voice of Democracy has been the VFW's premier scholarship program for High School students with more than \$2 million in scholarships and incentives worldwide. The program is open to students in grades 9 thru 12. Prizes and scholarships are awarded at the Post, District, Department (State), and national levels. The winner at each State level receives an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington D.C. to tour the city and be honored by the VFW and Auxiliary as they receive their portion of \$171k in national awards, the top scholarship being \$35,000.

This year's theme is, *"What are the greatest attributes of our Democracy?"* Entrants will record a 3 to 5 minute audio essay on a flash drive and submit it along with the 2023-2024 official entry form (available at our Post or on our website <u>vfwpost3617.org</u>) by the **deadline October 31, 2024**. The winner at our Post level will be submitted to VFW District 7 for their judging on November 18. Each District winner will advance to the State selection committee.



Patriot's Pen

The VFW Patriot's Pen youth essay program is open 6th, 7th, and 8thgrade students. This year's essay theme is, *"How are you inspired by America?"* Entrants must submit a typed 300-400-word essay on this year's theme and submit it along with the 2023-2024 official entry form (available at our Post or on our website <u>vfwpost3617.org</u>) by the **deadline** *October 31, 2024*. The winner at our Post level will be submitted to VFW District 7 for their judging on November 18. Each District winner will advance to the State selection committee.
