## **VOICE OF DEMOCRACY & PATRIOTS PEN**

Deadline for submitting to the 2024 Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen competition is **October 31st**. Submitted entries will be judged and scored by committee of VFW and Auxiliary members during the first week of November. The 1st Place winners will be submitted to District 7 for their judging on November 16. All District winners will be notified in December and invited to the Voice of Democracy Banquet at the VFW Mid-Winter Conference in January 2025 where the VOD winner for Washington State will be announced.



Voice of Democracy theme: *"Is America Today Our Forefathers' Vision?"*. The first-place winner from each VFW Department (State) wins an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C. in March 2025 where the national firstplace winner receives a \$35,000 scholarship paid directly to the recipient's American university, college, or vocational/technical school. Other national scholarships range from \$1,000-\$16,000 for all state winners.



# Wenatchee Purple Heart Ceremony

The community and local veterans gathered on August 7 at Pybus Market to honor recipients of the Purple Heart, a distinguished military decoration awarded to individuals wounded or killed in combat. The ceremony featured the Presentation of Colors by our VFW Post and American Legion Post 10, along with light refreshments. Organized by the Chelan County Veterans Program, the ceremony welcomed Purple Heart recipients from Chelan and Douglas counties, as well as family members of those who have received the award. During the ceremony, elected officials from Chelan and Douglas counties, as well as the cities of East Wenatchee and Wenatchee, read a proclamation declaring each area a Purple Heart City or County. A Purple Heart City or County officially recognizes Purple Heart recipients as part of



the Purple Heart Trail, and local jurisdictions may install road signs to mark the designation.


