5 Ways a Christian Can Approach Contentious Topics

As believers it's hard to understand how to approach the difficult topics surrounding elections. This year is one of the most contentious election years I have personally experienced. I am sad, frustrated,



and at times, disheartened. However, I am still called to engage and I encourage everyone to vote. As you make your ballot selections and discuss the issues with friends, family and neighbors, please think about approaching one another with the following tips:

1. Listen. "... You must all be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to get angry." *James 1:19*. Listening does not mean agreeing, simply extend human dignity to the person you are conversing with. You don't have to agree to listen.

2. Look for common ground. It may be small, but it is likely there. There are many things we all can agree on. If you want or need to be in relationship with someone you disagree with, look for what you agree on and build on that.

3. Let go of controlling tendencies. When you do disagree, realize it is not your responsibility to control someone or change their mind. You can even walk away after realizing either you are attempting to control the other person, or they are trying to control you. Do so kindly, not in a way to manipulate or belittle.

4. Limit contact with negative people. We all have a right and ability to complain or disagree. However, if all you ever hear from someone is how horrible things are, then maybe limit your time with that person as appropriate. It is not an attempt to ignore the negative and difficult things, but they do not need to be our focus. If you find things getting out of hand, set boundaries to protect yourself. Remember, God hasn't called us to fight every battle.

5. **Pray.** Philippians 4: 6-7 reminds us that when we pray, we can receive God's peace. Prayer is our most valuable asset and the best way to handle any difficult situation.

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. *Philippians 4:6-7 (NIV)*



Buddy Poppies

Buddy Poppies will be distributed at area stores on **Saturday**, **November 9**. We're always looking for new members to join the effort to help raise monies for our Veteran's Relief Fund. We don't "sell" poppies, rather we hand them out to the public with a request to remember our veterans. Some may decide to donate to our collection jar, and others may not. This is ok too, as the main purpose of poppies is to remind the public that we have veterans living in our beautiful valley, and to remember their service and sacrifice to our country.



If you would like to help hand out poppies, a signup list is located on the dry erase board at the Post. Volunteers can help on a morning shift from 9am to 12pm or an afternoon shift from 12pm to 3pm. Our locations in East Wenatchee will cover Fred Meyer, Safeway, and Bi-Mart, and at Martin's Market in Cashmere.

Veterans Day

Dedicated to American veterans of all wars, Veterans Day 2024 is on Monday, November 11. Originally called Armistice Day, it was created when in 1918, on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, was declared between the Allied nations and Germany in World War I, then known as "the Great War." Commemorated in many countries as Armistice Day the following year, November 11th became a federal holiday in the United States in 1938. In 1954, in the aftermath of World War II and the Korean War, Armistice Day became known as Veterans Day to honor **veterans of all wars and conflicts**.



In the days leading up to this holiday, members of our Post will be

participating in several **Veteran's Day school programs** across the valley as students learn about what it means to be a veteran, and participate in flag presentations to honor those that sacrificed and gave their all in service to our country.

Wenatchee Veterans Day **Parade will start at 10:30** from Wells Fargo Bank on N. Chelan Ave and travel south to Memorial Park located at S. Chelan Ave and Orondo Ave. After a short ceremony with rifle volley and playing of Taps, the parade route will head downhill to Mission Ave, and then north to the starting point at Wells Fargo Bank. We'll be participating with our 1957 Navy Shore Patrol Jeep "Annabelle" and handing out American flags along the parade route.

Afterwards, join us at Pybus Public Market from 12 noon to 3pm for a **free BBQ hosted by Wenatchee Valley Fire Department**. There will be music, resources for veterans, face painting for those interested in bringing their family, artwork on display from our community's children thanking veterans for their service and camaraderie of fellow veterans.

Additionally, several restaurants in town will be offering free meals to veterans on November 11th including Olive Garden, Red Robin, Denny's, and Applebee's.


