Our VFW Post has officially adopted the Army National Guard (ANG) unit recently assigned to Pangborn Airport. **ANG Charlie Company 1-112th Security & Support** is an aviation unit that flies UH-72 Lakota helicopters in support of DEA, Border Patrol, & fire suppression missions. There are about 15 full-time members assigned to the airport, with up to 80 members reporting for monthly drill training. Additionally, there is a yearly 2-week training session that takes place in the summer.

On Dec 7th, we hosted their unit Holiday Party at the Wenatchee Veteran's Hall. We provided a classic turkey and ham dinner with all the fixings. They had about 75 members attending including a few of their family members. A special thanks to our members that really stepped up and did all the cooking and logistics to make this an outstanding event.

# Quilt of Valor Presentation—Dr. Jurges

Just last week, the VFW was invited to attend a Quilt of Valor presentation to **Dr. Erich Jurges**, a Navy veteran and owner of Sagebrush Dental. Dr. Jurges grew up in Bremerton, WA and then went on to earn a degree in Systems Engineering from the United States Naval Academy. Dr. Jurges served our country as a Navy deep sea diver and bomb tech, including two combat tours in Iraq. While in the Navy, he earned a Bronze Star with Valor for his actions in Iraq. Following nine years of service as a Naval Officer, he entered the University of Washington School of Dentistry on the GI Bill. Commander Pieratt and Comrade Tony Warren presented him with our VFW Post challenge coin and thanked him for his service and sacrifice

On a very cold December 14th morning at the Wenatchee City Cemetery, officers and members our Post & Auxiliary, along with members of American Legion Post 10 and the Wenatchee Veterans Hall, performed a solemn ceremony to mark National Wreaths Across America Day. Each December, the mission to Remember, Honor and Teach about the lives and sacrifices of our veterans is carried out by coordinating wreath-laying ceremonies with Arlington National Cemetery, as well as at more than 3,700 additional locations in all 50 States, at sea, and abroad. This happens at the exact same time as the ceremony held at Arlington (which takes place at 12 noon EST). Wreaths were laid in honor of each branch of the military and in remembrance of their veterans. Additional wreaths were also laid at Evergreen, Valley View (Sunset), and Stemilt Hill Cemeteries.


