Several members of this post participated in the project which looked into the varied experiences of being in the military. Questions about being drafted, or joining voluntarily, branch of service, boot camp, and technical training started the interview. This was followed by more insightful questions about what it was like to be deployed, what did we miss the most, and if we struggled at all being away from home. All questions were agreed to before the interviews and it was done very professionally. The interviews ended with an opportunity to tell everyone what we thought the community should know about being a veteran. It was a great opportunity to share a little bit about the military and our experiences with the students.

Troubles with the CBOC?

Any veteran in our area who has tried to work with our local VA Community-Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) knows the troubles that can and do happen. Namely issues with the phone system, but also with appointments and getting the correct care. But what can we do about it? Well, we can talk to our government about it. And **U.S. Congresswoman Kim Schrier, representing the 8th District of Washington**, wants to hear your stories. Kelli Scott, the Congresswoman's Central Washington Office Manager, recently sent the following:

"Our office has heard from local veterans about how difficult it can be to communicate with the Wenatchee CBOC. We have conducted test calls of our own and experienced first-hand the mess of automated messages, dropped calls and endless hold times that vets have to deal with. The Congresswoman is extremely concerned about this and has been making noise with the Spokane VA and in Washington, DC. In order for her to most effectively make the case for communication improvements at the Wenatchee CBOC, she would like to collect stories from local veterans about their experiences dealing with the CBOC. She will then mention those experiences when speaking with the VA Secretary and others in leadership."

Additionally, Congresswoman Schrier will be in Wenatchee to meet with and hear from Veterans on November 9th. On the 24th of October many of the Auxiliary members were able to attend the Drive-by Birthday Celebration for Mr. Ott. It was heart warming to see so many helping to make a special day for a Veteran. The family seemed truly amazed by the turn out. A thank you to Brad for the planning, a job well done.

We have lots planned for the upcoming months. We will be collecting items from the East Wenatchee Dollar Tree store and delivering them to schools in need of gifts for students. This program runs through November. Donations can be purchased and left at Dollar Tree stores. We chose the Humane Society as our Community Outreach partner. We are asking members to save their empty toilet paper and paper towel rolls. The Humane Society uses them to hide treats for the shelter animals to entertain them in their kennels. Needless to say they go through a lot of rolls. We will have a collection box at the Post.

We have started on our Christmas plans. We will have a box for food collection at the Post starting in November: we will be collecting nonperishable food to give to Serve Wenatchee or the Bunker. Both organizations provide food for Veterans in need. We will hand out lists of the most needed items. Along with the food drive, we will also have a Veteran family to help at Christmas. We have been asked to help a single mom with two children. More information on the family will follow.

If you haven't signed up for a store for the Buddy Poppy drive please do so. Buddy Poppy Day is November 6th. The sign up sheets are on the board at the Post. We need all of the help we can get so this can be successful. Fundraising has been hard during Cov'd and this will help immensely. The stores are divided with two different shifts so should fit any ones schedule. This is a fun day and a great way to get the VFW and our Post out in the Community.

My name is David Schwab. I am a Veteran and just starting the process through Washington State Transportation Commission (WSTC) for naming the portion of Highway 97 that is within the Douglas County Boundaries to "World War II Veterans Memorial Highway".

A veteran from Klickitat County sponsored a similar request to the WSTC covering Hwy 97 from the Oregon border to the Yakima County line. After the WSTC approved his request he reached out to other Counties Veterans Advisory Boards that had US Highway 97 within their boundary, asking for their help to name US Highway 97 from the Oregon border to the Canadian border, World War II Veterans Memorial Highway.

If you area **resident of Douglas County** I would appreciate an email from you noting such and that you support the naming of Highway 97 within the Douglas County borders.


